Dear Friends of QLF,

As we wrap up the books on the 2011 budget year, and move forward into 2012, we wanted to take this chance to very briefly review with you the notable progress we have made on several fronts in the last several years. Specifically, in 2004, the QLF Boards of Directors embarked on a two-year strategic review process initiated by Obie Clifford, then serving as the Chairman of the QLF Board's Executive Committee. Obie convened two panels of QLF Advisors and Board Directors to think about QLF's future. The first panel, comprised of Jim Levitt, Randy Hack, Bets Kent, and Clare Tweedy McMorris, with key input from Philip Nadeau and several other Canadian Directors, was asked to examine broader issues regarding the organization's strategic direction. The second panel, including Rick Warren, Kathy Olmstead, Julie Early, Jonathan Labaree, Susan Peck, and Jim Levitt, focused more specifically on the mix of programs that QLF would likely advance in years to come.

The two panels issued a joint report in October 2006 titled, *QLF in Transition: Leadership for the Next Fifty Years.* The principal message in the report was that, in order to build on our proud heritage of service, QLF needed to navigate five key transitions:

- 1. A transition in senior organizational management;
- 2. A transition in the mix and focus of programs offered;
- 3. A transition of the Boards of Directors in both the United States and Canada;
- 4. A transition in investment policy and practice; and
- 5. A transition in financial and accounting operations.

We are very happy to report to you today that each of these key transitions is either well underway or substantially complete. Consider the following.

- 1. Regarding management, Beth Alling has taken responsibility for many of the key management roles alongside Larry Morris, who is still very much in the saddle as QLF's President. We are highly confident that as a team they have both depth and breadth. Should anything happen to Larry, Beth can very ably work with the Boards of Directors to keep QLF operating smoothly towards a bright future.
- 2. Regarding programs, in the past five years several very promising programs have been launched as several more mature efforts were concluded. As this transition in program

- mix has occurred, QLF continues to be highly regarded both by the people it serves and by our colleagues in the field.
- 3. Regarding the Boards of Directors in the United States and Canada, each has had its roles and responsibilities reviewed and refreshed in the past several years, enabling streamlined board operations. On most matters the two boards now work in tandem to offer our best guidance to QLF management. In addition, with the fall 2011 Board Meeting, we welcome a new group of relatively young and remarkably talented individuals to board membership.
- 4. Regarding investments, the investment committee members on both boards have thoroughly reviewed and updated our investment policies and practices to keep us on a notably steady course in very turbulent times.
- 5. Regarding financial and accounting operations, the QLF business office has been completely reorganized and is now operating in an efficient, well-organized, and timely fashion.


Our work, of course, is far from done. Bob Bryan, having celebrated his eightieth birthday, is still highly engaged as he demonstrated in his interactions with QLF-supported interns at Acadia National Park this past August. Larry and Beth, as well as our very capable staff, have completed a successful 2011 summer field season, making a difference in the lives of communities from the coast of Labrador to the coast of Belize and beyond. We have a great heritage in our historic Mission and achievements, and a great array of internationally significant community and conservation challenges to address.

In closing, we want to say that every QLF Board and staff member is most grateful for the support and enthusiasm of QLF's many friends in North America and around the world. Having successfully navigated the transitions that we faced in recent years, we look forward with renewed energy to the challenges ahead.

Greetings from the President

From managing the QLF endowment, to supporting (and in the case of one attending) the *Alumni Congress* in Hungary, these three have led QLF by example — expressed through their hard work, commitment, and wisdom. As hurdles loomed before me, one of the three always stepped in to get me over the hump. No doubt theirs will be big shoes to fill.

By the way, with these recent board retirements, you will notice in this publication an expanded listing of QLF's Honorary Directors. Anyone with knowledge of our history will understand how each of these individuals has influenced events. We are proud and grateful for their continued QLF affiliation.

Lest you think I dwell only on what has been, let me now turn to QLF's future. I do so with confidence and optimism. Six new directors — three women and three men — joined the board at the October meeting: Elizabeth Cabot, Alfred (Appy) Chandler, Charles (Chip) Collins, Halliday Hart, Dawn Leaness, and James Pohlman. Their ages span four decades. Extraordinary individuals, their resumes hold a treasure trove of experience and accomplishment. QLF is indeed in good hands as we move into the future.


In 2012, QLF will step forward to take its place in a world greatly troubled and looking for leadership. How will the Quebec-Labrador Foundation contribute to filling this need? One way will be to modify and expand our Volunteer and Intern opportunities to reflect requests from our home region in North America and partner regions abroad. Participants will travel from Gros Morne National Park, Newfoundland, to the former Grenfell Nursing Station (and now National Historic Site), Battle Harbour, Labrador. If you are a QLF Alum, yes, you *can* go home again!

QLF finds itself moving into the new year with stellar board leadership in both the U.S. and Canada. Many Alumni are in closer touch with us these days through QLF's Webmaster, Kevin Porter, who posts current news through a variety of social media outlets. No matter how you remain connected, thank you for staying with us.





Port Honduras Marine Reserve, Toledo District, Belize. The mangrove island is one of 135 that comprise the Port Honduras Marine Reserve. The Reserve lies to the north of the community of Punta Gorda. Six rivers flow into the Port Honduras basin and provide ideal estuarine habitat for fish, marine mammals, many species of birds, and other wildlife. The Port Honduras Marine Reserve was declared a protected area in 2000 and encompasses 160 square miles. A locally based non-governmental organization, the Toledo Institute of Development and Environment (TIDE), manages the Reserve. QLF Vice President, International Stewardship, Brent Mitchell, has established a long-term working relationship with TIDE staff, many of whom have been hosted in New England as part of QLF's Conservation Stewardship Exchanges. 

Muscat, Oman. The Sultanate of Oman has as its neighbors Yemen, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates, and sits on the southeast corner of the Arabian Peninsula. Sultan Qaboos bin Said assumed the throne in 1970 and has instituted numerous reforms to modernize the country. Omanis are proud of their culture and heritage as well as their environment.

In February 2012, QLF will host a Regional Meeting for Middle East and North American Alumni as a 20th Anniversary tribute to QLF's *Middle East Program*. These Regional Meetings are held every few years to keep Alumni engaged in local and regional conservation efforts and to gather consensus for future program direction. The title of the February meeting is *Environmental Issues and Consequences in the Wake of the Arab Spring: QLF's Role Going Forward*. In the spring of 2012, QLF will also work in partnership with the Office of Technical Assistance, U.S. Department of the Interior, to host Conservation Leaders from Oman to the United States.



Old City, Damascus, Syria. In 2006, the U.S. Department of State awarded QLF a grant to work with emerging conservation organizations in Syria. The process to receive official permission from Syrian Ministry officials to work in the country took six years and numerous trips by QLF staff to Damascus. With the support of the Ambassador of Syria to the United States and his staff, QLF succeeded in these groundbreaking efforts. Just as plans were underway to sign the final agreement in Damascus, the Arab Awakening swept across the Middle East. QLF stands ready to work with conservation leaders in Syria if the program can be reengaged in the months ahead.




